Children's Harbor is a nationally accredited nonprofit agency. Our mission is to help strengthen families who are struggling in our community, while providing safe shelter and support to teens in foster care so that they may grow into healthy, educated and productive adults.

We do 3 things.

We Keep Kids Safe.

Our main campus provides a family environment to teenagers in foster care and their younger siblings.

We Help Families Heal.

Our Family Strengthening team prevents kids from coming into foster care by providing in-house counseling and support to families who are struggling in our community.

We Shine a Light Toward Hope.


Our independent living programs provide support and wrap-around guidance to teens who have aged out of the foster care system through the early stages of adulthood.

11,000+ children

have been safely supported in their home and kept out of the foster care system by our Family Strengthening Team.

545 teenagers

were able to remain together with their younger siblings through our family group homes.

200 teen moms

were provided with education, coaching and the opportunity to live with their child and practice parenting skills within a supportive environment.

571 teens

who have aged out of the foster care system were provided with the housing, life skills and wrap-around support necessary to overcome their trauma and navigate through the early stages of adulthood.

Sometimes it doesn't just take a village; it takes an entire community

Our story begins in 1996, when a local businessman, Bill Mahoney, learned that there was a foster care crisis in our community. Children who had already suffered unspeakable abuse and neglect were being separated from their siblings and placed in different foster homes because of a shortage of placement options. Unable to ignore this reality, he reached out to other community-minded individuals. Together, they decided to create a solution.

Fast forward 25 years and thousands of lives have changed course because of the determination of a few.

1996

Founded by a group of volunteers, Children's Harbor was officially established as a nonprofit child welfare organization. We then began in-home counseling to families in crisis throughout **Broward County.**

The City of Pembroke Pines gave Children's Harbor a 30-year lease for an-8 acre campus.

Children's Harbor launched our on-site clinic and began offering trauma-focused individual and group therapy to children in our residential program.

Our second residental home opened to serve 12 siblings in foster care.

The playground was built with over 300 volunteers in one day.

2008

Our third house was built, serving 12 additional siblings.



Our first residential home opened to serve 5 pregnant or parenting teens in foster care.

The work we accomplished through the True North program will be used across the nation to advance the child welfare community's understanding on how to effectively serve youth transitioning out of the foster care system.

DID YOU KNOW?

In 2015, Children's Harbor was awarded a five-year, \$5 million Healthy Marriage Relationship Education (HMRE) grant by the Office of Family Assistance (OFA) in the Administration for Children and Families (ACF), which we titled True North. The motivation for True North was to help young adults who were aging out of the foster care system to forge a pathway to successful adulthood by providing the opportunity to participate in evidence-based marriage and relationship education programs and promising practices.

Children's Harbor was able to deliver holistic, trauma-informed, evidence-based programming to youth with foster care involvement, ultimately helping these youth to successfully transition out of foster care. The randomized controlled trial (RCT) impact evaluation was used in order to fully assess the impact of the program, augment the evidence-based relationship programming research, and to add value to the Office of Family Assistance (OFA) and Administration for Children and Families (ACF) learning agenda about HMRE programming.

FAMILY STRENGTHENNOG

Children's Harbor keeps children safe by improving the stability of their home lives. Our Family Support Counselors provide intensive in-home services, counseling and case management to families across Broward County.

In October 2019, we expanded our services to include Cognitive Behavioral Therapy so we could provide more intensive therapeutic services to our families!

STRESS impacts and often overwhelms.

Families all across Broward struggle with the "stuff" that life throws at them. For 23 years, our Family Support Counselors have been helping families heal through the unexpected challenges of life.

How we help.

Serving families for an average of 4-6 months, our team meets with each family on a weekly basis to provide counseling, teach parenting skills and connect them to additional resources in the community. 34%

of our families have two parents living in the home.

44%

of our families are single parent homes.

27%

of our families report an annual household income of \$50,000 to \$100,000.

Harbor History

In 1999, Children's Harbor was one of the first providers to be awarded a Family Strengthening contract. To prevent children from entering the foster care system, the Family Strengthening team began offering in-home counseling and case management services to families across Broward County. Over the past 23 years, this team has impacted the lives of over 11,000 children! ⁶⁶Children's Harbor wasn't just there for Ethan, they were there for the entire family.⁹⁹

A Father's Story

My wife had an aneurism. She was only 33 years old and we lost her. My little guy was the one who found her in the bathroom. We have three kids, all of them boys... and just like that, I was a single dad. They miss their mom, and I miss her, too. She was our world... she was everything to them. Ethan really had a hard time. He was having a lot of behavior issues. He was so closed off and secluded, he wouldn't even talk about his feelings. I didn't know what to do. He was suffering, and I didn't want him to feel that way. I wanted him to be bright and happy, like any normal kid. Going out playing, being able to make friends. Children's Harbor wasn't just there for Ethan, they were there for the entire family. They had the key, and they stuck it in and just unlocked him. It was amazing. That's another thing that Children's Harbor is great for. They're not just dealing with the person who is having the issue, they work with the whole family to learn how to work together as a team. I'm just eternally grateful to have the chance to speak to other people about what they did for me and my family and how they took a really bad thing and made it into a beautiful thing.

FAMILY HOMES

Our family group homes provide wrap-around support to 24 teenagers who have been removed from their parents because of egregious abuse or neglect.



Four homes dedicated to caring for teens in foster care and their siblings.

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Each home cares for six foster children, providing safe shelter and wrap-around support for a total of 24 teenagers.



We break the cycle of abuse through traumainformed interventions so that our kids can grow into healthy, educated and productive adults.

Harbor History

In 2006 we opened our first sibling homes, fulfilling our dream to create a safe space where brothers and sisters can live together while their family has the opportunity to heal. In 2008, we opened two additional homes and through the years, we have had the privilege of loving more than 545 children!

Our kids come to us broken.

On their own, children cannot recover from the devastating impact of abuse and neglect. They need specialized support to heal.

Our team of therapists immediately wrap our kids with support so they may begin to heal from their trauma.

Where there is light there is hope... and hope can restore a childhood.

Our life coaches provide one to one mentorship through evidence-based life skills programming to ensure that our teens graduate from high school and remain on track with their goals.

Did you know?

3X higher

High school dropout rates for foster youth than other at-risk children.

Over **40%**

of youth in foster care have changed schools five or more times, causing them to fall behind academically.

Less than 1/2

of youth in foster care nationwide end up finishing high school.

80%

of children in foster care struggle with major depression, anxiety and/or PTSD, compared to approximately 20% of their peers. Trauma has a profound impact on a child's academic performance. Because of the trauma they have experienced, our kids tend to struggle academically. For this reason, we added the Academic & Life Skills team to our continuum of care.

MATERNITY HOMES

In 2004, we opened our very first maternity home. Today, we continue to be the only maternity home in Broward County and have cared for more than 200 young moms!

> Teens in foster care are twice as likely as their peers to become pregnant before their 18th birthday. These young moms need strong support networks and resources in order to break the cycle of abuse and develop the skills they need to parent effectively.

> > Children's Harbor provides an opportunity for young moms in foster care to live with their babies and practice parenting skills within a supportive environment.

Harbor History

In 2021, our team was invited to partner with the Florida Institute for Child Welfare/ Florida State University to

provide qualitative subject matter expertise toward their mixed methods examination of maternal group homes. The information we contribute toward this research study will be used to improve maternal and child health outcomes across the state!

Our maternity homes are designed to:

- Provide trauma-informed individual and group therapy to address the impact of their personal trauma
- Ensure that our young moms receive consistent medical attention, including prenatal and postpartum care
- Provide parenting education that promotes positive and essential parenting skills and emphasizes nurturing and age-appropriate discipline
- Provide education related to substance abuse, sexual health, the prevention of second pregnancies, and sexually transmitted infections
- Promote self-sufficiency and independent living outcomes by helping them obtain high school diplomas/GEDs and pursue additional education and employment opportunities, or job training, depending on their interests
- Assist our young moms in registering for other supports such as child care, Medicaid and Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program so they may access regular medical care, including developmental screenings

We provide the education and wrap-around support that young moms need to successfully care for themselves and their child.

Statistically, teen parents in foster care are...

- Less likely to graduate from high school
 - 2 Less likely to receive adequate health care
- More likely to have mental health challenges, such as depression and anxiety
- More likely to struggle with unemployment and the possibility of homelessness than teens not in foster care
 - More likely to smoke, have inadequate nutrition, and deliver babies with a low birth weight

Because of the trauma they have experienced, our kids struggle to form healthy relationships with a trusted and caring adult, and even their own child...

Imani's Story

Imani was brought to Children's Harbor at the age of 15, when she was 5 months pregnant; "I've never been so scared in my life." Determined to make it on her own, Imani fought her way through her first few months at the Harbor. "It's not like they didn't try to help. I couldn't feel anything but mad. When someone would try to help me that made me even MORE mad. I didn't even know why I was mad. I was just mad. It took over everything, even when I didn't want it to. I felt like I was on fire. I couldn't control it and everything I touched, everyone I talked to, ended up being burned too."

Imani's anger continued to worsen. She stayed in her room planning her next escape, refusing to participate in group activities or therapy. She lashed out at the other girls in the home and her house parent, Ms. B. "I kept waiting for them to give notice on me and send me somewhere else, but they never did. Ms. B kept saying, '...That's ok, you're not here to meet my needs, but I'm going to do everything I can to meet yours. Let me know when you are ready to talk.' No matter what I did, they wouldn't change my placement and I was like, what the heck is wrong with these people?!?!?!"

Weeks turned to months and Imani slowly started to engage. "Ms. B kept saying: 'Imani. You are so much more than you are allowing yourself to be.'" Angry grunts became full sentences and eventually reciprocated conversations. "No matter what I did, they never gave up. This place is my home now and I feel loved here." She participates in individual and group therapy and has learned that journaling comes naturally to her as a form of self-expression. She gave birth to a beautiful baby boy (with Ms. B right there beside her, holding her hand) and is writing out her story, "so that Jacob will know where he came from and what he will never have to overcome."

INDEPENDENT LIVING

Brown's Harbor is a uniquely designed supportive housing program for youth, ages 18-23, who are transitioning out of the foster care system. Our program provides beautiful, affordable apartments, on-site support and guidance, and most importantly, a vibrant community where they feel they belong.

Guiding youth toward independence is at the very heart of our mission to ensure that every child that we are entrusted to serve is empowered and equipped with the tools they need to overcome their trauma and grow into

healthy, educated and productive adults.

Our Independent Living Team:

- Utilizes the Transition to Independence Process (TIP) Model[®]. This youth-driven, strength-based, evidence-supported framework focuses on guiding young adults to improve their real-life outcomes across transition domains such as Education, Employment, Career, Housing and Community Life Functioning.
- Promotes self-sufficiency and independent living outcomes by helping young adults obtain high school diplomas/GEDs and pursue additional education and employment opportunities, depending on their individual interests.
- Assists our young moms in registering for other supports such as child care, Medicaid and Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program so they may access regular medical care, including developmental screenings.

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO "AGE OUT" OF THE FOSTER CARE SYSTEM?

It doesn't take long for a young adult to realize that they aren't as ready as they thought they were to be "free."

On their 18th birthday, rather than step out into the world alone, our kids have the opportunity to transition to Brown's Harbor, a supportive housing program for youth ages 18-23 who are transitioning out of the foster care system.

At Brown's Harbor, our Success Coaches meet weekly with each young adult to specifically focus on financial literacy, career planning and employability skills so they can develop the hard and soft skills needed to position themselves to a higher level of employment. Together, they develop an individualized success plan that helps focus each young adult on long term goals and self-sufficiency.

In 2020, we partnered with the Frederick A. DeLuca Foundation to launch the Brown's Harbor Success Coach Program. This program works as an intensive supplement to a young adult's existing life coach services during the first 12 months of their experience at Brown's Harbor. WE SHINE A LIGHT TOWARD HOPE. ...until our kids have successfully navigated through the early stages of adulthood to reach a point of self-sufficiency.


